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The Dull But Very Important Bits... Statutory Responsibilities

There are a number of processes and actions that we have to take because we are a publicly funded body. The way that we must operate may be different to how private companies work. When we don't follow these requirements, they are picked up by the auditors and reported back. Some areas that have been highlighted this year are:

Expenses

If you need resources these need to be ordered through your school operations team so that we meet the requirements of our Financial Regulations and the Academy Financial Handbook. This ensures that we raise Purchase Orders, achieve Best Value and stay within school budgets.

Any expenses purchased outside of the usual systems should be very rare and only in exceptional circumstances. They need to be pre-approved by the headteacher and not exceed £25.

Pecuniary Interests

Please remember to complete the Pecuniary Interests form an update us if there are any changes during the year. Any work completed by someone linked to you must be reported to the ESFA, our funding body, before it occurs. This doesn't prevent the work from happening but must be declared so that our finances are transparent

Purchase Orders

All orders must have a purchase order and be approved by the budget holder before any resources can be ordered. This ensures that we don't overspend the budget and that we complete transactions in line with the purchasing requirements set out in Financial Regulations. Please make sure you think about resources that need ordering in plenty of time so that the processes can be correctly completed and we are compliant with the expectations





Common Health and Safety Myths in Schools

Health and safety regulations aim to reduce serious risks, not to ban activities unnecessarily. However, myths often lead to overly cautious decisions. Are you falling prey to these common misconceptions?

- Jewellery and wristband bans: Banning all jewellery or wristbands without assessing specific risks can be excessive.
- Hot food and drink restrictions: Strict limitations on hot food and drinks during school trips may add inconvenience without significant safety benefits.
- Overdone appliance testing: Routine testing is important, but over-testing low-risk items can waste time and resources.
- Playground equipment limits: Avoid risk -averse decisions that overly restrict playground equipment use, as it's essential for children's development. Remember, health and safety is about managing real risks—not imposing unnecessary restrictions!

"True safety is created not by avoiding risks but by preparing for them."

All schools recently had their annual Health & Safety Audit. The results are much improved on last year. As we know, Health & Safety is everyone's responsibility and it's great that everyone is taking pride in our schools, looking after each other our children and visitors. 
Sponsored Walk/ Run


Once all the money has been collected, the School Council will think about ways in which the sponsorship money (usually in the region of £800) should be spent and on what kind of resources.
