Admissions Policy

Aims

This policy aims to:

- Explain **how to apply** for a place at the school
- Set out the school's **arrangements for allocating places to the pupils** who apply
- Explain **how to appeal** against a decision not to offer your child a place

In accordance with the Education Act 2002 and the requirements of the School Admissions Code, the Trustees of Soke Education Trust are required to consult, determine and notify their admission arrangements for the school for September 2025

Legislation and Guidance

As an academy, the school is required by its funding agreement to comply with these codes, and with the law relating to admissions as set out in the [School Standards and Framework Act 1998](#).

The Trust will determine its admission arrangements, including Published Admission Numbers (PANs), each year and will notify the appropriate bodies and publish the determined arrangements on each school's website and to the relevant local authority by the statutory deadlines (arrangements must be determined by 28 February in the determination year and published by 15 March). Determined arrangements will be displayed for the whole offer year (the school year in which offers are made). This policy complies with our funding agreement and articles of association.

Roles and Responsibilities

The Trust participates in the co-ordinated admission arrangements of Cambridgeshire County Council and Peterborough City Council. Parents living in Cambridgeshire must apply via Cambridgeshire's common application form; parents living in Peterborough must apply via Peterborough's common application form. The Trust will ensure that copies of the Trust's determined admission arrangements are sent to both LAs and will work with both LAs on waiting lists, offers and the composite prospectus.

Whenever changes to admission arrangements are proposed (except where the change is an increase to the agreed admission number), the governing board will publicly consult on these changes.

Definitions

Normal admissions round - This is the period during which parents can apply for state-funded school places at the school's normal point of entry, using the common application form provided by their home local authority.

Siblings - The definition of a brother or sister sometimes referred to as a sibling: - a brother or sister sharing the same parents

- a half brother or half sister where 2 children share one common parent
- a step-brother or step sister, where two children are related by a parent's marriage - adopted children
- A child who has been adopted or is fostered by parents/carers who have other children
- A brother or sister must be living at the same address as the child when the application is made.

Looked after children - The statutory term for a child provided with accommodation by, or in the care of, a local authority is 'looked after child' (Children Act 1989); staff may use 'child in care' (CiC) or 'care-experienced' in routine communications where preferred, but the statutory term must be used in legal, safeguarding and statutory records. Children who, at the time of making an application to a school, are:

- In the care of a local authority, or
- Being provided with accommodation by a local authority in exercise of its social services functions
- Children who appear to the Admission Authority to have been in state care (i.e. in the care of or accommodated by a public authority, religious organisation or any other provider whose sole/main purpose is to benefit society) outside of England but ceased to be so as a result of being adopted only

Previously looked after children - Children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they:

- Were adopted under the Adoption Act 1976 or the Adoption and Children Act 2002, or
- Became subject to a child arrangements order, or
- Became subject to a special guardianship order **Compulsory School Age**

Compulsory school age - A child reaches compulsory school age on the prescribed day following his or her fifth birthday (or on his or her fifth birthday if it falls on a prescribed day). The prescribed days are 31 December, 31 March and 31 August.

Determination of admission arrangements for September 2027

The Board of Trustees of Soke Education Trust apply the regulations on admissions fairly and equally to those children who attend Alderman Jacobs School, Gunthorpe Primary, John Clare Primary, Northborough Primary, Werrington Primary and Wittering Primary.

Soke Education Trust is its own admission authority and is responsible for setting the criteria for admission and for their interpretation. As its own admissions authority, Soke Education Trust has made the decision to use the Cambridgeshire Local Authority Admissions Service for Alderman Jacobs School or the Peterborough Local Authority Admissions Service for schools in the Peterborough Area. These authorities co-ordinate the admission arrangements for schools in the Trust

The Trust adheres to the Fair Access Protocols operated by Cambridgeshire County Council and Peterborough City Council. Where a pupil is to be allocated a place under the Fair Access Protocol, that allocation will take precedence over any waiting list.

If your child was born between 1 September 2022 and 31 August 2023 you need to apply for a reception place for them for September 2027. You can apply anytime from 12 September 2024. To receive an offer of a school place on the National Offer Day, 16 April 2025, you must submit a complete application before midnight on 15 January 2025, the National Closing Date.

How places are offered

The application process for admissions into the initial year of entry is coordinated by Cambridgeshire Local Authority or Peterborough Local Authority which acts on behalf of the Trust to offer places at the requested school.

If applying to Alderman Jacobs School, parents should apply online at www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/admissions

For Gunthorpe Primary School, , John Clare Primary School, Northborough Primary School Werrington Primary School and Wittering Primary School, parents should apply online at <https://www.peterborough.gov.uk/residents/schools-and-education/school-admissions>

Applications should be made no later than the national closing date. Offer letters will be issued by the Local Authority on the published offer date.

Late applications will be handled by the Admissions Team.

To apply for a place after the start of the school year, or for any other year group, please contact the area LA Admissions Team for the school of your preference.

The application form must be returned to the correct LA Admissions Team who will then contact your preferred schools to determine the availability of a school place. The LA Admissions Team will write to you to confirm the details of the school at which a place is to be offered and, where appropriate, a suitable start date.

Where the Admissions Team is unable to meet any preferences expressed a place will be offered at the next nearest alternative school with places available.

Parents wishing to visit any of our schools prior to submitting an application are welcome to do so, though it may not always be possible to organise this at short notice. Please note that visits are not interviews and do not affect any decision regarding the availability of a place. Please contact the individual school to make arrangements.

All parents are advised to read the appropriate LA booklet for parents on primary admissions, before applying.

Soke Education Trust School Information

Alderman Jacobs School

Catchment

Alderman Jacobs School serves the catchment area of Whittlesey, Kings Dyke as far west as Horsey Toll, Pondersbridge as far south and including Oilmills Road, Whittlesey town and the area of the parish as far east as and including 311 Eastrea Road and Lattersley Hill Farm

Admission to Reception

Children are admitted to Reception without reference to ability or aptitude. For September 2027, our Published Admission Number (PAN) is 90.

Oversubscription Criteria

If there are more applications than available places, we apply the following criteria in order:

Children with an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP) that names the school will be admitted. NB. those children with an EHCP that does not name the school will be referred to the Statutory Assessment Team (SAT) to determine an appropriate place.

1. Looked After Children also known as Children in Care (CIC)

- Children in the care of a local authority (Child in Care - CIC)
- Children who were in care (CIC) but cease to be so by reason of adoption, a residence or subject to a Child Arrangements Order or Special Guardianship Order
- Children who appear to have been in state care outside England and ceased to be so as a result of adoption.

2. Children of staff employed by the Academy Trust of Alderman Jacobs School

- Where the member of staff has been employed at the school for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission to the school is made, and/or
- The member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skills shortage.
- Siblings

3. Children with a sibling attending Alderman Jacobs School at the time of admission (see definition below)

4. Children living in the school's catchment area

5. Children living outside the catchment area

Tie-breaker: If more than one applicant meets the same criteria, priority will go to the child living closest to the school, measured by a straight line from the home address to the school.

Definitions

- Children of staff: Staff are defined as employees of Alderman Jacobs School who have either been employed at the school for at least two years at the time of application, or who have been recruited to fill a post where there is a demonstrable skills shortage.
- Sibling: A brother, sister, half-brother, half-sister, step-brother, step-sister, or adopted/fostered child living permanently at the same address.
- Home Address: The address where the child normally lives with the parent/carer who has parental responsibility.

If the child lives equally at two addresses, parents can choose which to use for the application.

Applications based on future addresses will only be considered with proof (e.g. tenancy agreement or exchange of contracts) up to six teaching weeks before the expected start date.

How to Apply

- Reception starting September: Apply via Cambridgeshire LA at www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/admissions or with a paper application from the LA Admissions Team. Deadline: National closing date (usually mid-January).
- Offer of places: The LA will offer places to 90 children. If there are more applications than places, the oversubscription criteria will be used.

In-Year Admissions (Years 1–6 and after term starts)

- For a place in Years 1 to 6, or after the term has started, contact the Cambridgeshire LA Admissions Team. If a place is not available, your child's details will be held on a reserve list for one term. Parents are welcome to visit the school, but this does not affect the admissions decision.

Waiting Lists

Alderman Jacobs School, via Cambridgeshire LA, maintains a fair and objective waiting list until at least 31st December of the admission year. The list is ranked using the oversubscription criteria, not the date of application. Priority on the list is given to:

- Child in Care
- Previously Child in Care
- Children allocated places via Fair Access Protocol

Tie Breaker

If two or more children are equally ranked for the final place, priority goes to the child living nearest to the school, measured by straight line distance (using Ordnance Survey Address Base Premium™). If this does not resolve the tie, a random lottery will be drawn by an independent person.

Admission Appeals

If your child is refused a place, you have a statutory right to appeal.

- Appeals are managed by the Local Authority Admissions and Appeals Service.
- Submit your appeal request to the LA Appeals Team.
- You will receive at least 10 school days' notice of the hearing.

Admission Criteria

All preferences are treated equally. Children who have an education, health and care plan that names the school must be admitted. Children with an education, care or health plan that does not name the school will be referred to Student Assessment to determine an appropriate place. For September 2027 our PAN is 60.

Where applications exceed the PAN (60 places), places will be allocated in order to:

1. A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, residence/care arrangements order or special guardianship order. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).
2. Children who appear to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A child is regarded as having been in state care in a place outside of England if they were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation or any other provider of care whose sole purpose is to benefit society

John Clare Primary

Catchment

John Clare Primary mainly serves the villages of Helpston and Etton and the surrounding area.

Admission Criteria

All preferences are treated equally. Children who have an education, health and care plan that names the school must be admitted. Children with an education, care or health plan that does not name the school will be referred to Student Assessment to determine an appropriate place. For September 2027 our PAN is 20.

Where applications exceed the PAN (20 places), places will be allocated in order to:

1. A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, residence/care arrangements order or special guardianship order. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).
2. Children who appear to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A child is regarded as having been in state care in a place outside of England if they were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation or any other provider of care whose sole purpose is to benefit society
3. Children who are both living in the catchment area* served by the school and have siblings** of compulsory school age still attending the school at the time of their admission.
4. Other children living in the catchment area* at the time of admission.

Northborough Primary School

Catchment

Northborough Primary mainly serves the villages of Northborough, Maxey and the surrounding area.

Admission Criteria

All preferences are treated equally. Children who have an education, health and care plan that names the school must be admitted. Children with an education, care or health plan that does not name the school will be referred to Student Assessment to determine an appropriate place. For September 2027 our PAN is 30

Where applications exceed the PAN (30 places), places will be allocated in order to:

1. A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, residence/care arrangements order or special guardianship order. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).
2. Children who appear to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A child is regarded as having been in state care in a place outside of England if they were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation or any other provider of care whose sole purpose is to benefit society
3. Children who are both living in the catchment area* served by the school and have siblings** of compulsory school age still attending the school at the time of their admission.

Werrington Primary School

Catchment

Werrington Primary mainly serves the areas of Werrington Village and the surrounding area.

Admission Criteria

All preferences are treated equally. Children who have an education, health and care plan that names the school must be admitted. Children with an education, care or health plan that does not name the

school will be referred to Student Assessment to determine an appropriate place. For September 2027 is 60.

Where applications exceed the PAN (60 places), places will be allocated in order to:

1. A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, residence/care arrangements order or special guardianship order. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).
2. Children who appear to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A child is regarded as having been in state care in a place outside of England if they were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation or any other provider of care whose sole purpose is to benefit society
3. Children who are both living in the catchment area* served by the school and have siblings** of compulsory school age still attending the school at the time of their admission.

Wittering Primary School

Catchment

Wittering Primary School mainly serves the areas of Wittering, Wansford and Thornhaugh and the surrounding area.

Admissions Criteria

All preferences are treated equally. Children who have an education, health and care plan that names the school must be admitted. Children with an education, care or health plan that does not name the school will be referred to Student Assessment to determine an appropriate place. For September 2027 our PAN is 30.

Where applications exceed the PAN (30 places), places will be allocated in order to:

1. A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, residence/care arrangements order or special guardianship order. A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989).
2. Children who appear to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A child is regarded as having been in state care in a place outside of England if they were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation or any other provider of care whose sole purpose is to benefit society
3. Children who are both living in the catchment area* served by the school and have siblings** of compulsory school age still attending the school at the time of their admission.

Process for Admission

Admission of Children into the Early Years Foundation Stage – at the start of the academic year

The Department for Education (DfE) Admissions Code 2014 requires that admissions into the Foundation year group, at the beginning of the academic year, be coordinated by the Local Authority. This is in order to provide a better service to parents and carers. This co-ordination involves a common application form and a common timetable as described in the 'co-ordinated scheme'. Each Local Authority publishes a composite booklet entitled Admissions Information booklet, published each year. This provides parents and carers with information on the admission process, timetable and how parents can apply for a place in the school of their choice.

Parents have a right to express a preference for the school of their choice and they should do so using the common application form.

Deferred and Part-Time Entry

- Children offered a Reception place can start full-time in September following their 4th birthday.
- Parents can defer entry until later in the year (no later than the start of the term after the child turns 5, and not beyond the start of the summer term).
- Parents can request part-time attendance until compulsory school age.

Example Options:

- Start full-time in September
- Attend part-time until the term after their 5th birthday
- Defer admission (but not beyond the summer term 2027)

Admission of Children out of their normal age group

Soke Education Trust do not believe it is in the best interest of pupils to be deferred to another year. As a Trust with experienced and knowledgeable staff, we are able to provide suitably differentiated and adapted, educational provision for children of all abilities.

It is our belief, based on evidence from the Education Endowment Fund, that children experience negative effects to their education when their schooling is deferred. If children are from disadvantaged backgrounds the negative impact increases further and is even more likely to increase their inequality. The research demonstrates that on average children who are held back a year in their schooling make at least three months less progress than their peers, on top of any current gaps in their learning. The negative effects increase with time and there is an increased risk that children will drop out of school entirely later on. Attempting to reduce the risk of drop out at points prior to the end of statutory schooling can cause social upheaval as the relationships built up over time are split. Furthermore, children can make relationships with others, who are not their chronological peers which can become inappropriate. Joining a school below a child's chronological age may create problems, socially and academically in the Primary phase and can be problematic with the administration of the statutory testing procedures.

Parents requesting admission out of the normal age group will be assessed on a case-by-case basis.

In Year Admissions

Soke Education Trust uses Cambridgeshire Local Authority Admission or Peterborough Local Authority Admissions Service to co-ordinate the admission arrangements for trust schools. Soke Education Trust schools will advise the Local Authority of all available places.

An application must be submitted to the Local Authority. They will respond, in writing, to advise whether an offer of a school place is available.

The Trust does not always have enough places available for every child whose parents have applied for a place. In this case each school will apply their admission criteria.

Tie-Breaker

Peterborough Schools

In cases of equal merit, priority will be given to the child living nearest the school as measured by a straight line. Distance is measured in a straight line using the Local Land Property Gazetteer (LLPG)

- provided from the seed point located at the child's home address to the seed point for the school. The seed point is taken from the Ordnance Survey's (OS) Address-Point® dataset. It is used to locate individual residential and school addresses using grid references.
- If a place becomes available it will be offered to the child at the top of the reserve list for the year group or, if no reserve list exists, the place will be offered to the first child for whom an application is received.
- The address used for the purpose of admission is the home address at the time of application. Applications based on future addresses can only be considered up to six teaching weeks before the child is expected to take up the place and upon confirmation of tenancy or exchange of contracts.

Waiting Lists

Continuing interest lists for all oversubscribed primary schools will be maintained by the Local Authority until co-ordination ends, i.e. 31 August. Continuing Interest lists are held in strict oversubscription criteria order. Applicants will be ranked according to each individual school's oversubscription criteria and the Local Authority will continue to coordinate on behalf of Soke Education Trust to allocate places from those lists, if places become available.

After the offer date there will be no distinction between 'on-time' and 'late' applications on continuing interest lists.

Soke Education Trust schools will advise the Local Authority when a place becomes available. The Local Authority will then offer the place to the child who is at the top of the continuing interest list.

Parents will be asked to confirm that they wish to stay on a higher preference school's continuing interest list when accepting an offer of a place at a lower preference school. A child's details will not be added to a school's continuing interest list if a higher preference school has been offered. Refusal of a place when offered a preference school will automatically remove them from the continuing interest list.

If, after a child is offered a place at a lower preference school which they have not yet started, a place becomes available at a higher preference school and their name has been added to the

continuing interest list for that school, the original offer will be withdrawn and a new offer is made. The reason for this is that the child will not yet have started or placed on roll at that lower preference school and we are obliged to meet a parent's highest preference. If a parent is happy to accept and keep the lower preferred offer, they must inform the Local Authority to remove them from the higher preference school's continuing interest list, or the offer for the lower preference will be withdrawn and their place (at the lower preferred school) will be offered on to the child who is top of the continuing interest list for that school.

After the offer date, if a parent wishes their child to be considered for an alternative school, a new application form must be completed listing the new order of preferences.

Appeals

For any child subsequently refused a place, parents/carers will have the right to appeal against the decision, to an independent Appeals Panel.

If your child is refused a place at Gunthorpe Primary School, John Clare Primary School, Northborough Primary School, Werrington Primary School or Wittering Primary School you have a statutory right to appeal against that decision.
